## GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS

Another of our Charter Members is Bette Clark!

She was born in the Jane and Bloor area of Toronto and began sewing at the ripe old age of 5!! After using up all her mother's scraps she began calling on the neighbors for any she could have from them. Obviously this love

of sewing spilled into her education and she graduated from Western Technical School in Dressmaking, Tailoring and different fashion arts. Following graduation she worked for Marie Cluthe, a designer at Bay and Bloor, then moved on to Simpson's Bridal Salon. Bette then worked at teaching for the Singer Sewing Machine Company, eventually becoming Assistant Supervisor for Southern Ontario.

It was on a blind date that she met her future husband, Bill, (sometime we'll try and get the rest of this story). They have two children, Peggy who is a member of our Guild, and Gordon. As a stay-at-home mom during the day Bette kept in her hand at teaching by becoming involved at the adult education programs at Burnhamthorpe and Royal York Collegiate teaching dressmaking and tailoring. During 1967 Bill's job took him and the family from Toronto to Fort Erie and Bette kept herself busy by starting a dressmaking school in her home.

Bette and Bill had a cottage in Muskoka and during the summer she taught classes at Marie Aiken's Tower Studio in Gravenhurst and courses at Georgian College. During this time Bette and Bill moved to New York City as Bill was again transferred by the bank. Peggy and Gord were grown and on their own so Bette was free to pursue more teaching options, and over the next ten years she taught classes in the local adult education program in New Jersey as well as returning to Canada to teach workshops in Barrie at Georgian College, and was invited to be a guest lecturer for the first few years of the Canadian Home Sewing Show.

Bill took early retirement in 1989 and so they were able to realize their dream of moving to the "cottage" in Muskoka. Always on the look-out for places in which she could become involved in sewing, Bette joined the Muskoka Lakes Quilters and is still a member. It was here that Bette met Wendy Wight. Wendy told Bette about a new quilt group being formed in Port Sydney at the Makepeace Studio so off they went and along with other like minded ladies started Pine Tree Guild.

Bette taught several workshops at Makepeace Studio and for Pine Tree when the meetings were held at Rowanwood and since at our meetings in Bracebridge. Never one to feel she couldn't always learn more, Bette has taking many, many workshops, and firmly believes that even learning one thing makes a workshop worthwhile.

What has really excited Bette the most of all the projects in which she has been involved is the quilt she designed and created with the help of the Muskoka Lakes Quilters for the New Library at Port Carling. To date this quilt has raised over \$11,000. Not content with this project, Bette made another quilt for the children's library and this has brought in over \$6,000. For a donation to the Friends of the Library you can have the name of your choice on the spine of a "book" on the quilt.

As if the library projects weren't enough, Bette has made many seasonal banners for the Sanctuary and Hall at Port Carling United Church of which she is a member, as well as several Ministers' stoles. A few years ago Bette was invited to show some of the banners at a juried Exhibition of Liturgical Art in Orillia. Recently the Sunday school was blessed with another of Bette's creations, a banner depicting the story of Noah's Ark, and this banner included art work done by the children.

Bette said she is amazed at the growth of Pine Tree Guild from the original 15-16 members to our 180 plus members today.

Thanks Bette for sharing your sewing and quilting journey with us. Perhaps we can prevail upon you to bring some of your church banners for show and share. Members like you are a great inspiration to the rest of us.

## OUTREACH PROGRAM

In 2010, the Guild donated 59 quilts to Interval House and Chrysalis, the Great Beginnings Programs in Huntsville, Bracebridge and Gravenhurst, and to the long term care at the hospitals.

We held two workshops over the year, where we worked on cuddle quilts; a series of new cuddle quilt patterns were developed to supplement the basic 9 x 5 grid pattern.

We completed a quilt for the Quilts of Valour program (which donates quilts to injured soldiers); our quilt was chosen to be used for a raffle, to generate funds to help with the finishing of more quilts. We have started work on two more Quilts of Valour.

We prepared a summary of the numbers of quilts donated by the Outreach Program, and submitted the information to the Canadian Quilters' Association, as part of National Quilt Month; the CQA includes our information, and mentions our guild in an article which appears in the Spring 2011 Newsletter.

I thank all the quilters who contributed to the various projects of our Outreach Program.
